Lesh reanimates the Dead

Tourists visiting Times Square are usually advised to be on the lookout for pickpockets, taxis and out-of-control bike messengers. For the month of November, they'll also need to avoid getting run over by throngs of tie-dyewearing music fans, as former Grateful Dead bassist Phil Lesh takes over the Nokia Theater for three weeks with his new band Phil Lesh & Friends.

Beginning on Halloween, Phil & Friends will play 14 concerts at the Nokia. It's the second year in a row Lesh has scheduled a marathon of shows in New York, or as he calls it, a "Phil-athon."

"I like being in one place for a period of time," he says. "It allows us to settle in and just focus on the music, because you're in one place instead of getting on a bus each night and traveling six hours."

As the Grateful Dead did, Phil & Friends will play a

we're playing the same songs. But for me it's not so much about the songs themselves, as what can happen with them at any particular moment."

In fact, when asked what he's most proud of about his time with the Dead, Lesh didn't choose the music. Instead, he talked about the community that surrounds it.

"The whole thing from the beginning was about the community and that's held true for all these years," he said. "A lot of the people who come to see us are repeat customers. They come back not just for the music, but to be together."
